INTRO

October is a New Month, with a Clean Slate, and Fresh Beginnings. May every day in October give you all strength, courage, renewed hope, strong faith, inner peace and the Blessings of Autumn. I realize this is the month of increased hurricane activity in the Caribbean area. We will keep a watchful eye out; however, I have a feeling that all will be well this season.

This month's featured nonprofit is: **The Mattie Williams Neighborhood Family Center**

The Mattie Williams Neighborhood Family Center is a nonprofit human service organization with a designated service area of Eastern Clearwater, Safety Harbor, and Oldsmar. The service area includes significant pockets of minority concentrations and single parent female head of households and an increasing number of families living in poverty. Ninety-nine percent of the families served by the Center have incomes below 80% of average median income levels.

The Center's mission is to nurture and strengthen children, youth, adults, their families and communities through support services, education, and collaborative partnerships to improve lives and achieve self-sufficiency. We accomplish this mission through partnerships with other agencies, educational programs, and family support assistance. The number of people that are served has tripled in the last four years due to the economic challenges more families are facing. A high percentage of our clients are working poor.

Their motto is to "BRIDGE THE GAP" using a combination of services to help individuals and families to stay in their homes and keep the family together. There are four main components to this effort: **critical basic needs, financial assistance, career development, and youth development {school readiness/school success}**.

Critical basic needs

Critical basic needs include free food, clothing and hygiene products. The Food Pantry provides food to families living in our service area. Volunteers run the food distribution operation with staff oversight and support. Emergency food on an as needed basis is distributed throughout the week. Holiday Baskets, both Thanksgiving and Christmas are distributed. The Clothing Closet provides free clothing to those in need including those who are homeless. On a daily basis, personal items not covered by food stamps like deodorants, shampoo, soap, diapers, wipes etc. can be obtained as well. Mattie's Kids Program also covers shoes and clothing for the children. Every Friday approximately 30



children identified by the schools and Community Police Officers receive a backpack filled with ready to eat food for the weekend. This program has been a great success.

Financial Assistance

Financial Assistance is the second component of the Bridge the Gap. Thanks to fundraising efforts, they can provide limited financial support to families facing shut off of water or electricity. If children are in the home and these basic services are turned off, then the children may be taken into DCF custody. If they know about this type of situation, they prevent the child from going through that experience. Mattie Williams provides assistance with transportation and housing

emergencies, such as gas vouchers, bus passes and rental assistance. As an ACCESS site, they assist families and individuals in filling out online applications for food stamps, Medicaid and cash assistance.

The bilingual staff members on site can assist those with language challenges. Last year they provided more than \$45,000 in financial assistance, which included paying water bills to the Cities of Clearwater, Safety Harbor and Oldsmar. Indirect assistance includes providing holiday gifts for children of families facing financial hardship. Last December, they gave out gifts to 554 children. Many of these helps are grounding folks into a more stable life.

Career Development

This is designated to assist people in making significant changes to improve their overall situation and move toward self-sufficiency. The Family Assistance Coach works one on one with individuals to help them achieve their long-term goals. They aid with resume writing and review and development of interviewing skills for those seeking employment. They utilize the computer lab to provide basic classes for adults in popular office software and find job opportunities. The computer lab also serves the children and keeps them from falling behind in school.

Youth Development

Mattie Williams Center pays close attention to the progress of the children preparing them for school. Their back to school program provides the necessary supplies to enable children to start the school year off with the tools they need. In August, they handed out more than 452 backpacks filled with school supplies. In addition, their Bright Ideas Youth Development programs served 101 students in their After-School Programs and 76 children in the Summer Camp program. The summer programs have played a significant role in preventing summer learning loss many students experience.

I think we can all say Congratulations to Janet Hooper and troops for doing such a wonderful job of caring, sharing and making a Huge Difference. Our very own Mark Howe is the President of the nonprofit Board at this present time. Kudos to all.
